

## **BEULAH ADAMS ROBINSON**

### Lehi Centennial History 1850-1950

Beulah Adams Robinson, wife of the late George G. Robinson, was born January 9, 1872, in American Fork, Utah.

She received her education in the public schools. She always attended Primary and Sunday School from which she won honor for her perfect attendance.

At an early age she was employed by members of the O.A. Smoot family of Provo and later by Bishop W.D. Robinson of American Fork. It was here she met George G. Robinson, who came from Wilmington, Delaware to take charge of his uncle's flour mill. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. G.M.D. Robinson and family later came from the east and for a time lived in Spanish Fork.

They were married on January 2, 1894. To this union were born five children: Raymond George, Velma (Mrs. J. Reuben Russon), Beulah (Mrs. J.N. Litson), Sherman D., and Marie Afton.

Their early married life was spent in American Fork. They moved to Lehi, June 1910, purchasing the Lehi Roller Mills and the Garff home. Raymond, the eldest son, was an active associate of his father in the operation of the mill.

They later built their beautiful home and moved into the Second Ward. It was here she became active in the Relief Society as a visiting teacher and on the cooking committee. She is a member of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers.

Mr. Robinson was on the building committee for the second ward chapel. He passed away November 30, 1936.

They loved company and their hospitality was always extended to their many friends.
