Lehi's Library Evolution

When my family moved to Lehi in 2002, we were excited to live in a town with its own library. Back then, in neighboring communities were happy "story times" at the old library, and we've always been grateful to those who established it. For this month's newsletter, I did a little history dive to learn more.

In the early 1900s, Lehi citizens began advocating for a public library. On February 8, 1910, the City Council established a library and reading room in the 1891 "blue rock" Senate Building. Originally a saloon, it became Lehi's first public library until 1915 (when the rent increased, and the library was moved). However, the collection of books was so sparse and outdated that at the time, the newspaper said it was "Almost a Joke!" Despite these humble beginnings, Addie Winn Rodeback became Lehi's first public librarian, marking the start of Lehi's formal commitment to literacy.

The push for a Carnegie Library gained momentum in 1917 when the City Council, commercial club, business owners, and citizens rallied for the creation of a permanent building. A petition was submitted, and the election held in 1917 resulted in overwhelming support. The city moved forward with plans to build a Memorial-City Hall, incorporating a public library, city offices, and community spaces in a Spanish-style brick building (now serving as the home of the Hutchings Museum).


This was a significant milestone in Lehi's civic development and library history. A big drive for library books was organized by Lehi's schools in April of 1921. To encourage participation, the school room that collected the most books was treated to a "peanut feed!" After years of planning, the \$10,000 Carnegie Library was officially dedicated and turned over to the people of Lehi on January 5, 1922. The library had 3,535 books on hand at the close of 1922, with 1,025 borrowers' cards issued. From then on, the library became an increasingly important resource in our community. Today, there are approximately 103,000 items and over 20,000 registered cardholders!

A century later, in response to the city's rapid growth, Lehi is once again preparing to open a Civic Center that will blend a modern City Hall with an expanded Public Library. Our story is one of growth and resilience, and our library's journey—from its humble beginnings in 1910 with a small and outdated collection, to the dedication of the beautiful Carnegie Library in 1922, to storytime for the Albrecht kids in 2002—reflects our community's ongoing dedication to education and public service. The new City Hall and library will carry forward this enduring legacy of civic pride for generations to come.

Our Spring After-School session began on March 3 and will continue through May 8, 2025. Our After-School classes offer reading classes for Lehi students K through 4th grade and Math classes for Lehi students 1st through 4th grade. Classes are 45 min twice a week, Mon/Wed OR Tues/Thurs 4 p.m. & 5 p.m.

The Summer Reading & Math Session will run from June 2 through July 29. Assessment and registration appointments are required for the summer session.
