ABOUT LEHI CITY

AS UTAH'S SIXTH OLDEST CITY, LEHI IS RICH IN PIONEER AND OLD WEST HISTORY.

Originally settled by Mormon pioneers, Lehi has been known as Sulphur Springs, Snow's Springs, Dry Creek, and Evansville. It was incorporated as Lehi City in 1852. The Overland Stagecoach Route, the Pony Express Trail, and the Transcontinental Telegraph all passed through or near Lehi during the peak of their use.

Today, the city offers abundant opportunities to live and play. Lehi is the fifth fastest-growing city in the country, with a population of nearly 65,000. As the gateway to Utah County, Lehi is surrounded by Utah Lake and the Oquirrh and Wasatch Mountain ranges. Residents and visitors have easy access to hiking, camping, fishing, mountain biking, and a variety of other outdoor activities.

Lehi operates under the six-member council form of government. The mayor and five city council members are each elected at large to serve four-year staggered terms as the legislative council. The city council is responsible for policy-making decisions while the city administration is responsible for the daily operation of city departments and services.

The city is quickly becoming a premier commercial center along the Wasatch Front. Several landmark companies like Adobe, Microsoft, Xactware, Vivint, Xango, and IM Flash call Lehi home. USA Today ranked Utah County as the best-performing economy among large U.S. metro areas in 2017, specifically mentioning Adobe's plans to expand to a second facility.

Indeed, Lehi City is pioneering Utah's future!

Sign up for utilities by filling out an application found online at www. lehi-ut.gov/utilities or by visiting the Utility Billing office during regular business hours: Monday - Thursday 7 a.m.- 6 p.m. A \$30 setup fee is required to activate services.

WATER SHORTAGE MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Lehi City Water Department regularly monitors the level of city water sources. At the beginning of each month during the peak water usage season (June, July, August, and September), the Lehi City Water Department will use internal and external data to determine drought conditions in Lehi City. Based on water levels, the Water Department will determine which water shortage phase will be implemented for that month.

WATER SHORTAGE PHASES

The level and severity of water shortage has been categorized into three phases. Each phase is labeled with a color to better illustrate when a respective phase is in effect. The three phases with their respective color are:

Phase I	Phase II	Phase III
Normal Conditions	Moderate Shortage	Severe Shortage

Lehi City will inform water users of which phase is in effect. Each phase includes voluntary and/or required conservation actions to provide guidance on how to respond to water shortages. The table below provides detail on required action for each phase of the plan.

During Phase II and Phase III of the management plan, lawn watering is restricted according to city or county street address.

Phase II Lawn Watering Restrictions: Sprinkler irrigation is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. and limited to three days a week.

- Odd-numbered addresses: Monday, Wednesday, Friday
- Even-numbered addresses: Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday
- Spot-watering on Sunday

Phase III Lawn Watering Restrictions:

Sprinkler irrigation is prohibited between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. and limited to two days a week.

- Odd-numbered addresses: Monday and Friday
- Even-number addresses: Tuesday and Saturday
- Spot-watering on Sunday

Exceptions are made for new lawns that require frequent irrigation within 30 days for establishment purposes. Exceptions are also made for short cycles required for testing, inspecting, and maintaining irrigation systems. ENFORCEMENT STRATEGY

In order to conserve water and ensure adequate fire protection to its residents and businesses, the city has established a progressive enforcement strategy. Enforcement measures are intended to educate water users about proper water conservation and reserves punitive action for repeat violators.

The complete secondary water system conservation ordinance, including specific information on mandatory conservation efforts, can be found in the municipal code, Chapter 13.28. Lehi Streets Division works throughout the year to maintain and improve city streets in order to provide safe vehicular and pedestrian travel.

SNOW REMOVAL

Snow removal crews will make every possible effort to keep major streets clear of snow and ice. Response time depends on the severity and duration of a storm. Roads with the most traffic receive top priority, followed by residential areas. Subdivisions, cul-de-sac, and end streets will be plowed after four or more inches of snow have accumulated.

WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS

City ordinance prohibits parking on the street during a storm and for 24 hours following a storm. Violating the ordinance may result in a parking citation. During a storm removal emergency, as declared by the city administrator, vehicles impeding snow may be impounded.

What to Remember During a Storm

- Property owners are responsible for clearing driveway openings, sidewalks adjacent to their property, and area around fire hydrants.
- Shoveling, plowing, or blowing snow into the street is prohibited by city ordinance.
- To ensure regular mail delivery, clear snow around your mailbox.
- Install mailboxes appropriately to withstand snow removal efforts.
- City rights-of-way for snow storage extends nine feet from the curb. Landscaping and personal property within the rights-of-way is installed at the property owner's risk.



POWER ON PROGRAM

Lehi City's *Power On Program* helps the power department better serve you during an outage. Register your contact information with the city in order to get your power turned on faster.

How it Works:

- · Visit www.lehi-ut.gov/power-on,
- Provide your name, address, and telephone numbers (cell, home, work).
 Keep your information up to date.
- When you call during an outage, the computer system will recognize your number and dispatch a technician to your address.

HOME ENERGY SAVINGS PROGRAM

Lehi City has teamed up with Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems (UAMPS) to help residents do their part to decrease energy use while earning incentives. Participate in the *Home Energy Savings Program* by purchasing energy efficient appliances and lighting fixtures. Your purchase may qualify you for a cashback incentive.



Please allow 48-hours notice for each burial. Have your monument company call the office during business hours to ensure headstones are placed properly.

Names of and information for deceased persons buried at the cemetery can be found at the cemetery office or online at www. namesinstone.com. Leashed pets are welcome to accompany you during your visit, but please clean up after them.

To preserve the beauty and cleanliness of this hallowed ground, the cemetery is unable to allow patrons to plant personal trees, shrubs, or flowers. Personal decorations, decor, flowers, and other objects will be removed after five days.

BUSINESS LICENSING

A valid Lehi City business license is required for all commercial businesses that are located within city limits. Business licenses help regulate business to determine if they are operating within applicable laws and ordinances.



HOME BUSINESSES

Senate Bill 81, signed into law by Governor Herbert in March 2017, made changes to the provisions authorizing a city to charge a fee or require a license for certain home-based businesses. The city may still charge a fee and require a license for those businesses that create an impact on the city (see Subsection 7(b)). This fee covers the administrative costs of processing and issuing a license.

If you feel someone may be in violation of the home occupation laws of Lehi City, call the Lehi City Police Department at 801-768-7110 to file a complaint.
